# **FAIRNESS UNDERPINS SMART POLICY**



#### Why are we emphasising fairness?

#### 1. Values

 We believe in governing for <u>all</u> Victorians and giving each person a fair opportunity to participate in social and economic life.

#### 2. Economic productivity

 Giving more people opportunity to participate allows us to harness more of the human capital in our State. Allowing people to miss out means we are wasting their talent and contribution.

#### 3. Sound financial policy

 Prevention is cheaper than cure. By investing in early intervention and prevention, we can avoid putting even more money into dealing with the problems in the long-run.

# A FAIRER VICTORIA FOLLOWS MASSIVE RE-INVESTMENT IN UNIVERSAL SERVICES



#### **Education**

6,200 extra teachers and staff, 28 new schools built

#### Health

6,400 extra nurses, 29 hospitals being rebuilt

#### **Police**

Over 1400 more police, 145 police stations upgraded

## **Transport**

• \$10.5 billion plan for next ten years

# **RE-INVESTMENT DELIVERING RESULTS**




- Strong results Victoria now leading Australia on important social indicators:
  - Kindergarten participation rate 96.4% vs national average 83.4%
  - Year 12 or equivalent retention rate 85% vs national average 82.7%
     (Victorian rate up from 82.9% in 1999)
  - Highest number of apprentices of any State
  - Crime rate down by 21.5% since 1999
  - Child protection notifications are down by over 4% in areas where Family Support Innovation projects established and substantiated cases of child abuse are down by more than 12% statewide

## A FAIRER VICTORIA



- Despite these substantial improvements, the Bracks Government recognises that some Victorians still experience disadvantage
- We released Challenges in Addressing Disadvantage to outline this. For example:
  - Around 150,000 Victorian children live in families where no one has a job
  - Students leaving school before Year 12 have much higher rate of unemployment
  - Life expectancy of Indigenous
     Victorians is 20 years lower
  - People from the Middle East and North Africa have lower labour force participation rates




# **CONCENTRATION OF DISADVANTAGE**




# Strategic response to addressing disadvantage:

  - harnessing the State's human capital

## Why participation matters so much now:

- New challenges to our economy:
  - Ageing population
  - Skills shortage
  - International competition (China, India)
- Boosting participation in our workforce and society is best way to boost our economy

#### A FAIRER VICTORIA – OUR FRAMEWORK



## Framework launched last year, being maintained:

- 1. Access to universal services
- 2. Reducing barriers to opportunity
- 3. Support for disadvantaged groups
- 4. Support for disadvantaged places
- Making it easier to work with Government and involving communities in decisions affecting their lives

Community input and decision making at heart of new approach to creating a fairer society

#### A FAIRER VICTORIA – REFORMS FOCUS



- Early intervention & prevention
- Community capacity to make decisions
- Linking infrastructure with social development goals
- More localised services and local partnerships
- Making Government easier to work with


## Community is central to the major reforms:



# Community is central to the major reforms:

- Community capacity to make decisions:
  - Increasing community decision-making brings multiple gains
  - Eg: Neighbourhood Renewal Program



#### A FAIRER VICTORIA – ROLE OF COMMUNITY



#### Investments centred on communities making own decisions:

- Neighbourhood Renewal extended to 4 new areas
- Community partnerships Frankston, Whittlesea
- Building Stronger Communities grants package four grants joined up and offered to the LGAs in most need
- Local area planning funding grants to councils up to \$150,000
- Volunteer resource networks expanded
- Funding to upgrade neighbourhood houses
- Establishing new U3As in areas of need
- Best Start program expanded to 14 more LGAs, to 27 total
- Regional Management Forums



**Example:** Bendoc's new Community Bus – flexible community transport for a small remote community in north east Victoria

→ community decided own needs, Govt supported their solution

**Example:** New community enterprises providing employment and training opportunities in disadvantaged communities

# Substantial funding backs the reforms:

- **\$788 million** last year across whole framework, including record boosts for:
- Mental health,
- Disability,
- Indigenous Victorians,
- Family violence,
- Neighbourhood Justice
- **\$851 million** this year, through 82 new initiatives, to build on reforms with particular focus areas ...



Professor Jack Shonkoff M.D. confirms that:


Brain architecture and skills are built in a "bottom-up" sequence, so:


**Example – Changing locations of disadvantage... Growth areas of Melbourne**

# Focus – homelessness



Homelessness is one of the major barriers to participation

New action in A Fairer Victoria includes:

- Increase and upgrade housing stock
- Boost youth homelessness services: outreach, purpose-built facilities and private rental brokerage
- Help low income families build their own homes
- Fund weekly street soccer program and bid for Homeless World Cup

# Focus – community transport



### \$10.5 billion statewide transport plan, including:

- More bus services for outer suburbs and country
- Massive rail upgrade biggest since City Loop built
- Accessibility for people with a disability, prams (\$250m)
- Community transport boost:
  - New projects to cover all LGAs outside Melbourne
  - Helps communities get better use of existing transport such as school buses, taxis, community buses



# Focus – multicultural communities



# Supporting our multicultural diversity boosts our human capital too

#### New actions in A Fairer Victoria include:

- Promote multicultural harmony with multi-faith events
- Community based refugee health nurse services
- Vocational ESL services
- Community grants
- Interpreter services
- Cultural awareness training



# Focus – involving community in solution



#### **New initiatives increasing the input from communities:**

- Community renewal local partnerships to set local priorities
- Neighbourhood House funding boost more hours & support
- Youth Transition Workers for youth disengaged from work or study
- Extension of No-Interest Loans Scheme to 77 more locations
- Working with the RSL and CFA to convert underutilised assets into community centres
- Establishing 15 Youth Foundations across Victoria, to give young people experience in financial management and decision making about grants for youth projects
